This is the fourth of a series of online events by ECOWEEK, an NGO with the mission to change people's habits and promote sustainability. The 48-hours virtual event will focus on the intersections between environmental and social struggles, to challenge, once again and with more strength, the way we think, talk and write about architecture. A large number of women architects, talking from multiple locations and from different research-grounds, will discuss about architecture and transitional justice, colonial heritage and decolonization, refugee camps and humanitarian settlements, public space and feminism, environmental and labor struggles. Going through a session of virtual lectures and panel discussions, and a session of virtual theoretical and 'hands-on' (from your desk) workshops, we aim to offer an eye-opening and empowering experience, in order to change the way we think about sustainability, resilience, and climate adaptation, through sustainable design and placemaking in today's world.


ECOWEEK is an NGO with the mission to raise environmental awareness and to promote the principles of social and environmental sustainability through design. Since 2005, ECOWEEK has developed programs in 17 countries and a network in 56 countries. ECOWEEK workshops engage young architects and designers, in innovative practices and sustainable design, green buildings, and placemaking, that re-imagine and re-shape public space.

This virtual ECOWEEK event is curated by Maria Luisa Palumbo, an architect, researcher and educator based in Rome, Italy, in collaboration with the University of Arkansas Rome Program, University La Sapienza, GBC Italia Chapter Lazio and Rebel Architette. Passionate and critical scholars and professionals will share their research and experience to foster a new approach to sustainability in architecture, one deeply rooted in the search for social justice.

Suad Amiry

writer, conservation architect, RIWAQ: Centre of Architectural Conservation, Ramallah

Suad Amiry is a writer and a conservation architect. She is the founder of RIWAQ: Centre of Architectural Conservation, Ramallah, Palestine. Amiry and her Organization RIWAQ received several international architectural awards, amongst them the prestigious Aga Khan Award for Architecture in 2013.

She is the author of the well-known book Sharon and My Mother-in-Law (2005) which has been translated into 20 languages and was awarded the prestigious 2004 Viareggio Prize.

She is the author of numerous non-fiction books including: Nothing to Lose But Your Life: an 18 hour Journey with Murad (2009), Menopausal Palestine. Women at the Edge (2010), Golda Slept Here (2014), Damascus (2016), and Peasant Architetture in Palestine: Space, Kinship and Gender (2018). Amiry's latest book An English Suit and a Jewish Cow (2020) has been been published in Italy. Amiry taught architecture in the Department of architecture at Columbia University, the Birzeit University and the University of Jordan.

Esra Akcan

architectural historian, Cornell University

Esra Akcan is Michael McCarthy Professor in the Department of Architecture and the Director of IES at the Einaudi Center for International Studies at Cornell University. Her research on modern and contemporary architecture and urbanism foregrounds the intertwined histories of Europe and West Asia, and offers new ways to understand architecture's role in global, social and environmental justice. Akcan received awards and fellowships from the Radcliffe Institute for Advanced Studies at Harvard University, Graham Foundation (3 times grantee), American Academy in Berlin, UIC, Institute for Advanced Studies in Berlin, Clark Institute, Getty Research Institute, Canadian Center for Architecture (2 times scholar), CAA, Mellon Foundation, DAAD and KRESS/ARIT.

She is the author of Landfill Istanbul; Architecture in Translation; Turkey: Modern Architectures in History (with S. Bozdoğan); Open Architecture: Migration, Citizenship and Urban Renewal of Berlin-Kreuzberg; Building in Exile. Her upcoming books are Abolish Human Bans and Right to Heal.

Sandi Hilal


architect, artist, educator, DAAR, Decolonizing Architecture Art Research

Sandi Hilal is an architect, artist and educator. She has developed a research and project-based artistic practice that is both theoretically ambitious and practically engaged in the struggle for justice and equality.

She is currently the Co-Director of DAAR, Decolonizing Architecture Art Research, an architectural and art collective that she co-founded in 2007 with Alessandro Petti and EyalWeizman, in Beit Sahour, Palestine.

She co-founded Campus in Camps in 2012, an experimental educational program hosted in Dheisheh Refugee Camp in Bethlehem with the aims to overcome conventional educational structures by creating a space for critical and grounded knowledge production connected to greater transformations and the democratization of society.

Her latest publication *Permanent Temporariness* (Art and Theory, Stockholm 2019), co-authored with Alessandro Petti, is a book, a catalog, and an archive that accounts for 15 years of research and experimentation. *Permanent Temporariness* was published in connection with DAAR's eponymous retrospective exhibition that was inaugurated at the New York University Abu Dhabi Art Gallery in 2018, and at the Van Abbemuseum in Eindhoven in 2019.



Francesca Perani

architect, designer, activist, RebelArchitette

Francesca Perani is an Architect and designer, her work ranges from interior architecture to interactive design, from illustration to activism. In 2007 she established FrancescaperaniEnterprise www.francescaperani.com, an award winning studio based in Bergamo, Italy. Material and visual experimentation, trial and error, emotional and communicative charge finds its expression in spaces, objects and graphics. The practice is driven by the power of shared creativity as an effective instrument to bring about change. Co-founder and curator of activist project RebelArchitette www.rebelarchitette.it advocating for equality in Architecture through the open dissemination of 1000 female role models. She is the founder of cutoutmix www.cutoutmix.com: an internationally popular free open platform as an answer to the growing need for more equal and diverse cutouts populating design renders.

Aslihan Gunhan is an architect and Ph.D. candidate in the History of Architecture and Urban Development Program at Cornell. Design Director and Founder of H21, a multi awarded international architecture practice, Alessandro Melis has received a Master and a Ph.D. in Architecture and Urban Design from the University of Florence. He is Professor of Architecture Innovation at the university of Portsmouth and the architecture research leader of the Architecture school. He is director of the Cluster for Sustainable Cities. As an academic his specialist teaching and research interests are in the fields of climate sensitive design, urban mutations, and community resilience. Previously he was head of technology and director of the Postgraduate engagement School of Architecture and Planning at the University of Auckland, Director of the TPI Urban Strategies Postgraduate Master at the University of Applied Arts Vienna, Honorary Fellow at the Edinburgh College of Arts and Visiting Professor at the Anhalt University Dessau. He has been appointed by the Italian Government as the curator of the Italian Pavilion Venice Biennale 2021.

Anna Chiara Cimoli is an art historian based in Milan. After graduating in Art History, she earned a diploma in Museology at the Ecole du Louvre in Paris and a Ph.D. in History of Architecture from the Polytechnic of Turin. She teaches a course in Social History of Art

Since 2006 she deals with research and education in architecture, with a special focus on neighborhood regeneration and housing. In 2008, she defended her Ph.D. thesis entitled "Renovation strategies for social housing estates" at the Roma Tre University, Italy. She did most of her research at the Delft University of Technology,

Holland, thanks to a one-year scholarship of the Rotary Foundation by the Rotary International. After a two years research contract at this university, she came back to Italy where she worked as a researcher and teacher at the Venice University Institute of Architecture, IUAV, the Sapienza University of Rome, and the University Studies Abroad Consortium of the Università degli Studi della Tuscia, Viterbo. She now works at the University of Arkansas Rome Program where she teaches Architecture studio, Studio Urban Focus, Interior Design studio, Architecture of the City, and Modern and Contemporary Rome.

THE WORKSHOPS

W1 The place of gender with Maria Luisa Palumbo

Four texts, four authors, four women's voices about the space of the home, the space of the city, the space of the planet, and the space of design and of history writing. Reading and discussing a bell hook's text on homeplace as a space of resistance, a Kim Anne Savelson's text on gender and race, an Alice Friedman's text on the Schröder House, and a Donna Haraway's text on the Anthropocene, we will talk of violence and liberation struggles. We will think through issues of women's exclusion and inclusion. We will share thoughts about what and how we studied architecture, about the voices we heard and we keep with us in each line we trace. We will talk of collapse, about refugees and refuges, of making kinships, and making space in a more gentle and inclusive way.

All you need is reading the texts that you'll receive before the workshop and come to the (virtual) table prepared to discuss them. We will read, write, share and talk collectively (and in breakout rooms).

W2 Public toilets for all



Designing public toilets for all: between technological innovation and gender identity.

The workshop focuses on the need of environmentally and socially conscious design in everyday places. Architecture not only plays a crucial role in the acknowledgement and embodiment of concepts of equality, diversity and inclusion, but it must also act as a driver for change blurring the boundaries of gender identity by means of redesigning the built environment.

The design task is about an ecological, gender free public bathroom capable of ensuring access to safe, hygienic, inclusive, technological, innovative and smart sanitation services that provide privacy and dignity for all. The design framework involves demand and performance requirements related to comfort, accessibility, management and environment: key issues involve the achievement of good thermal comfort, natural ventilation, natural lightning and greening indoor strategies due to their influence on psychophysical health and well-being.

International institutions architecture universities and city municipalities are moving in this direction as it is also an issue with respect to the human right to water and sanitation (Goal 5, SDGs) and to universal access and gender equality (Goal 6, SDGs).



Designing the protest: signs of resistance ('cause all voices need to be heard)

Protest signs have long been used on the picket line and in marches around the world, playing an indispensable role in appropriating public spaces. Our current global crisis has been highlighting new community needs.

The fragility of both private and public spaces, the need for a sustainable integration and inclusion. Marches and protest performances (online-offline) are crucial growing opportunities for change in the next future. Starting from collective research on itineraries of protest signage, the workshop will focus on defining designing display of signs, posters, banners, installations, stencils, graffiti, personal accessories, flags, physical or digital performances. The workshop is a call to action in building alternative narratives for a global community united by a shared ideal of democracy, equality, respect.


WANT CHANGE? DESIGN YOUR PROTEST!

W4 Women in Art and Architecture

with Consuelo Lollobrigida and Francesca Riccardo

The workshop will explore the presence of women artists in Rome, from 16th to 18th century. Starting from a preliminary inventory as drafted out in my book 'Following Women artists. A Guide of Rome', participants will be asked to charting and mapping on Giovanni Battista Nolli's Pianta di Roma women artists' houses and workshops (or botteghe) and their works of art sheltered in Museums, Galleries, Churches and palazzi of Rome. Through images of paintings, sculptures, and buildings, we will stress out the position of each artist and contextualize her work in the given art historical period.

This revisited Nolli map, will constitute the workshop outcome. Well beyond the map, our process will provide a methodological model to be applied in any time and space to give voice to those who have been excluded and hidden by the history.



THE CURATOR

Maria Luisa Palumbo _ architect, researcher, educator /paesaggisensibili.com

Architect and senior fellow of the McLuhan Program in Culture and Technology of Toronto University, since 2003 I am a member of the Italian National Institute of Architecture in Rome. My research focus on architectural theory as a practice of social engagement, to question and promote notions of justice, ecology, and democracy. I am the author of New Wombs: Electronic bodies and architectural disorder (Birkhauser, 2000) and Paesaggi Sensibili. Architetture a sostegno della vita (Duepunti, 2012); and the editor of Architettura Produttiva (Maggioli, 2012), Laboratorio Roma (Aracne 2016), and Fare Città nella Città (Aracne 2017). I am a regular contributor to Artribune, Domus, and Eastwest. In 2012, I curated reMade in Italy, final section of the Italian Pavilion at the 2012 Venice Biennale of Architecture, with Luca Zevi as the main curator of the exhibition Italian Architecture, from Adriano Olivetti to the Green Economy. I am currently a Phd student at the History of Architecture and Urban Development (HAUD) program at Cornell.

Francesco Bedeschi _ architect, educator, expert of sustainable design

Based in Rome, Italy, Francesco Bedeschi is an architect, educator and an expert of sustainable design. He currently serves as the Director of the University of Arkansas Rome Center, the European Hub of the University of Arkansas and a professor of integrated architectural design and restoration. He is also the manager and coordinator of the program of study in Italy of Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute, State of New York. A member of the Executive Committee of the Green Building Council Italia, Francesco has played a pivotal role in the growth of the organization and in establishing relations with the American counterpart. In 2010 he founded the Lazio Chapter, where he was elected President. Bedeschi was also appointed the Coordinator of the Standard Committee for the development of the Historical Building Protocol at GBC Italia. Furthermore, Francesco works as sustainability consultant with SINERGI Integrated Building Sciences LLC, a private company with offices in the USA, Mexico and Italy. Under SINERGI, Francesco has led the growth of the Company's services in the European market - gaining project experience with both the USGBC's LEED Rating System for International Projects as well as the GBC Italia protocol.

Consuelo Lollobrigida is an art historian, post graduated fellow at Sapienza University, Rome, and Adjunct Professor of Art History at the University of Arkansas Rome program. She attended the Master in Patrimony and Heritage of the Church (Pontificia Università Gregoriana, Rome) and completed her Ph.D. in Art History at Sapienza University, Rome, with a thesis on women artists in Baroque Rome.
